Behaviour is high on the political agenda and a key concern for many education professionals. Whilst political debate, press coverage and professional concerns about 'problem behaviour' generally focus on older children, there is also concern about the number of children exhibiting challenging behaviour in the early years. Children's experiences in the Early Years are crucial in determining their adaptability and coping strategies later on, in helping them develop resilience. Both norms and extremes of behaviour can be understood using a framework that applies knowledge of how behaviour develops to consider a child's needs and what might be appropriate expectations of that child.
